11. **REPORTS OF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICERS: MAYOR, DIR. OF PUBLIC SERVICE, DIR. OF ADMINISTRATION, DIR. OF ECONOMIC DEV., DIR. OF FINANCE AND DIR. OF LAW.**

Mayor: What Carol is referring to is I am actually down in Columbus; my daughter is going to have her baby tomorrow morning and so we are down here for that and I am also on a meeting with the City of Stow. I have been requested to join their Mayor's Report tonight when it comes up to talk about the Regional Dispatch Center that is going to be . . . if it does get formed, at the corner of North Avenue and Howe Road. That is the tentative spot; the old Weaver Workshop area. That is the area that is owned by Summit County and it has been vetted out for different sites and if a Regional Dispatch Center would be formed, then that would be the ace site to go with. So, I am going to be speaking to Stow about that.

The purpose of my talking to Stow is that since we are a contractor with Stow; it is going to be my request to City Council to allow us to join the Regional Dispatch Center if one is formed at that location, but that would be subject to City Council. Stow is asking me about that because we are contracted there now and so what would happen with the contract with Stow?

They are going to put on the ballot, before the deadline for the November election, to allow the City of Stow to be able to join a Regional Dispatch Center outside of Stow. It is currently in their Charter that they have to ask their voters first. With that being said, that is what I will be speaking on and so if I don't make it to the end of our meeting, that is the reason why.

Mayor (Cont'd.) This week we had the opportunity, several of us, to visit the **Summit DD site**; now that is the middle building. That is the old Weaver school building; the building that is being requested, or we have the opportunity, if we pick that up; that would go to the City of Tallmadge which would include the ball field in the back and the soccer fields. But you also have to be careful what you ask for; it is a brick building; it has a lot of potential, but also a lot of future expenses and so we are going to form a committee to see if that would be the best option before Council has to decide if we take it for \$1 or not with the liability.

We also had a demo guy with us so we know if we demo the entire thing what that cost would be. We don't have that cost yet. So, there is a lot to move on on that. Summit DD's goal is to vacate that building sometime in 2021 and so with that, we will move one.

I am happy to announce that **Chief Williams was appointed to a Special Task Force** with the Summit County Sheriff's and the City of Akron to look at Police Rules and Regulations and procedures and so he is representing not only the City of Tallmadge, but the Summit County Chief's Association. There will be more to come on that.

I really think that is it unless Council has any questions for me?

Mr. Carano: Dave, this is Mike Carano. I was wondering; there is that Ohio Collaborative that I think seven communities like Green, University of Akron Sheriff's Department, and Stow and a few others have done all three of the things on the collaborative and the last I saw and it was an older document, but it was only one; the first one. Are they working on the other two?

Mayor: Yes, we are working on all of those with the Collaborative; that is the committee that is actually on too to help come up with those regulations.

Mr. Carano: I have one more quick question; I think it is called the 1033 Program; Tallmadge in the past has gotten, I don't know when that was, but they got some assault rifles. Do you know how many we have in Tallmadge?

Mayor: Well, we have AR15's that are in the police cruisers and they also have shotguns, but we have at least one per vehicle. Is that what you are referring to?

Mr. Carano: Yeah, I didn't realize they were in the vehicles. It's been a long time since I have had a ride in one of those. It was just a question I was asking because I am a little concerned about, although Tallmadge is not nearly what any other community is, but the sort of militarization which has gone on over the last 30 years with Police and the equipment that the Federal Government is putting upon a lot of these communities. I mean, some have tanks and rocket launchers and things like that and hopefully we don't have any of those.

Mayor: No.

Dir. of Pub. Service: Just a real quick update on our Parks. As of right now, **the parks are as open as they have been in months. The tennis courts are open. The baseball fields have been open; the playgrounds, all except for Maca, and that is closed for construction purposes, but the playgrounds are open and this week, the basketball courts have been open.** We still have to practice the CDC and the Ohio Responsible Guidelines in these facilities.

Moving on to the **Rec Center**, I would like to share a slide with you. Can you guys see that?

Mr. Carano: Yup.

Dir. of Pub. Service: So, starting July 6th, our fitness classes are coming back and as you can see it is quite a variety and also some cycling to yoga. So that should really help get some people back in the Rec Center. The Rec Center hours are Monday through Thursday 6:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. and then we close until 3:00 p.m. and then we are open again from 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Friday we are open from 6:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. and Saturday, we are open from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. and we are closed Sunday. Again, we are hoping that these fitness classes . . . we are going to have to play off the hip here because it could change daily on what is successful and what instructors we can get, but that is a stop in the right direction.

No childcare as of yet. They are still not there yet with that.

Ord. 48-2020; I have to **go out for bid for the trash and recyclables** and I showed this slide back in January and it shows our quarterly rate down there in yellow and then the boxes below you can see the current rates from everybody that have just recently gone out to bid and it looks like it jumps up a good \$10 to \$15 across the board all except for Green. So, just something to be aware of and we should probably be letting the residents know that. There is a good possibility that it is going to go up by about that much.

Pres. of Council: Mr. Rorar, do you happen to know what our renewal is going to be with Republic, or do you know when you will get that renewal from them?

Dir. of Pub. Service: We won't get that until we go out to bid. They have to bid again. That's it for my report. Are there any questions? No one responded. Thank you.

Dir. of Administration: Good evening everyone. Just quickly I wanted to make sure you are aware that **as of July 1st; City Hall is going to begin to allow public entry without an appointment between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m.** We want to, the Mayor has made it clear, he wants the public to have increased and improved access to City Hall and so we are doing everything we can to plan for that to be done as safely as possible.

We have devised a plan that we are going to be publicly distributing probably next Monday at the latest and maybe tomorrow at the earliest to give all of the employees and yourselves an idea of the plan that is in place to do that.

Real quickly, basically reception will be held in the lobby on the main entrance to City Hall and there will be a receptionist placed there to try to address the needs of any visitor that shows up at City Hall. There will be a telephone there so they can contact someone and bring the employee down to meet them if necessary, but mostly what we think we will be doing is guiding them through a way to via telephone or e-mail take care of their business. That is what our emphasis is going to be on is to kind of get them help without them moving further into the building for everyone's safety.

So, the pedestrian foot traffic flow is going to change. It is basically at the reception area and then we are going to bring employees to them, and they might meet in a large area like Council chambers if they actually had to do a face to face meeting. Once you receive that, I am open to any questions or suggestions you may have to make this as safe as possible for our employees as well as visitors to the building.

I also just wanted to bring to your attention that seven states reported new highs for the current Coronavirus hospitalizations according to a number of sources including the CDC and WHO. Ohio is not among them; you will be happy to know, however, it is Arizona, Arkansas, California, North Carolina and South Carolina, Tennessee and Texas. What you might be interested to know that Ohio is experiencing a spike currently in southwest Ohio around the Cincinnati area as of today and they expect it is from things that have occurred a couple of weeks ago as we started to open up and there seems to have been less attention in that part of the state to some of the social distancing and wearing a mask and public things like that and so we are again, getting information from the acting Director of Public Health in Ohio and also the Governor to remember the very basics. Although we are sick of the Coronavirus, it is not done with us and so we all need to be aware that we need to be maintaining social distance and wear our mask in public. That's all for me unless you have questions. Thank you.

Mr. Carano: Madame President, I have a question for Dr. Cooper. Don, I see where Crown Castle; are we hooked up to that in the City now; is that where we are getting our internet through?

Dir. of Administration: So, **Crown Castle** is an infrastructure provider and so they provide connectivity. The City has been working over the last year really to get its internet service from **Fairlawn Gig**. Although I don't believe it is fully activated yet, we have been testing and we are connected to Fairlawn Gig and we are working out the details now. Hopefully in the very near future, we will be fully dependent on them and they will be our internet service provider; Fairlawn Gig which will for just a little bit more money, will just about . . . it will significantly increase our band width so that we can do many more things in the City and things like this would be faster and without error.

Mr. Carano: One more question I guess; the contract with the present one; when does that expire; is that the end of the year? You may not remember off the top of your head.

Dir. of Administration: Our present contractor for our internet service expires at the end of the year I believe, and we have a contract that will start with Fairlawn Gig which starts on July 1st. So, the reason for the 6-month overlap is to work out any bugs and make sure that everything is working correctly before we stop the existing contract.

Mr. Carano: I would like to applaud the work that you have done on that and bringing that forward. I think that is very important. I don't know, because of the Covid thing if finances make things more difficult now, but in the future, if ever Tallmadge could provide that for the whole City particularly with the way Net neutrality is being challenged by the large corporations who want to control; they will be able to control the

Mr. Carano (Cont'd.) speed and they are now doing content with providing of internet; it will be a real mess and actually it will be very limiting in many ways in my opinion on our democratic ability to get information. So, I just want to applaud you on the work that you are doing. Thank you very much.

Dir. of Econ. Development: Good evening. Just very briefly; we continue to reach out and engage with our business owners. We have met with several developers in the last week just to kind of check in on some of the development projects that were in the pipeline prior to Covid, but we anticipate some action here in the near future.

We are also still awaiting announcement from the Greater Akron Chamber on the Small Business Grants. Tallmadge received over \$300,000 in small business support so again we are waiting for that official announcement.

As you probably saw, Leppo did finish their concrete pour. They have an official ribbon-cutting ceremony and it is going to be scheduled for Monday, August 24th at 2:00 p.m. and we will make sure that all the leadership team, City Council as well as the Tallmadge Chamber receives an invite for that event. Again, that is Monday, August 24th at 2:00 p.m. and unless there are any questions, that would conclude my brief report this evening.

Mr. Loughry: This is Dennis. Do we have any update, yet actually on three things; the opening of Meijer's and Menards; a projected date of when there may be a light installed at Washburn and East Avenue; and residents are asking what is going on in the Brimfield portion of that development where they are tearing down the houses; what is projected to go where the houses are now?

Dir. of Econ. Development: Yes, all three great questions. In terms of the Meijer's and Menards opening; let me follow up with our contact. The last time we had communication with at least the reps for Menards, they were still quite uncertain as to when their official opening would be. So, let me get a concrete date for you on that. Really the same things hold true for the Meijer's; they are uncertain when that official opening would take place, but I will search for that answer for you.

In terms of the Washburn intersection, let me check with the Mayor and our Service Director and get some information on that and we will be happy to share that with Council and then lastly, the houses that are being demolished as we speak that are inside Brimfield Township located right there would be to the west of the Menards; it is our understanding that those are commercially zoned properties and as you stated, they were single-family homes in many cases in pretty poor condition and so the DeHoff Development Group does have title to those properties and those will be slated for some sort of commercial activity at some point in the future.

Mr. Loughry: Thank you.

Mayor: Madame Chair, if I could, I will speak on the Washburn intersection. GPD, who is our engineer for the ODOT project; we are working with them for the design of that intersection. The traffic light will be earmarked to be installed in 2021; probably the second or third quarter of 2021. A lot of stuff has to go on that I have to bring to Council to get the engineering funds. We are looking at doing a Residential TIF from the Ripley farm to pay for that intersection, so we are getting an engineer's estimate and it is about slightly under \$1 million for that intersection to be tied in with a traffic light.

Pres. of Council: Normally we would go to the Director of Finance, but she is out of town, so we will go to the Director of Law; Mrs. Raber.

Dir. of Law: Thank you. I have no report this evening.

Mr. Loughry: Could I ask a question of Mrs. Raber?

Pres. of Council: Yes, you may.

Mr. Loughry: Would you please just, whenever there is something at all to report on the lawsuit that we were part of with the City of Akron; whenever there is an update to just provide it. That's all. Apparently, I don't think there is, but I just wanted to ask; that's all.

Dir. of Law: Sure. The latest pre-trial was kicked back again to the end of July, I believe, so there has been no movement at this point.

Mr. Loughry: Thanks.

Pres. of Council: Before we go on to Item 12, I am remiss to the fact that I skipped over Item 7, which was Community Input and because of the Coronavirus, we are asking that if anybody had community input that they were to e-mail or contact our Council Clerk by a certain time and I do not have any information from any of the community, so I just wanted to put that out there as well and now we will go onto to Item 12.

Two of them are minor changes and they all came from the same House Bill; House Bill 166 from the 133rd General Assembly, but the biggest change would be the change reflected in Chapter 537 which basically is the codification of the State's version of the "Not Under 21", which we had been supportive of anyway. So, there is really nothing different or nothing really substantially new I guess I would say except for the Not Under 21, which now just reflects what the State had already adopted, which again, we had been in support of that initiative previously anyway. Just give it a reading today.

Mr. Loughry: I would recommend that we just give it a reading this evening Mrs. Allman.

Mrs. Allman: Me too. Anyone else want to add to this? No one responded.
